# From Process to Product



Mary Nickles, Director and Producer

My husband and I first heard of Senior Follies when he was the pastor of the Belton Presbyterian Church. A few of the church members were part of the Follies and we went to the show to support them. Fast forward a few years... I started working at the Montessori School of Anderson and became familiar with Annette Martin. She had worked with the students before I was there and had written a song that is now used every year at Promotion. This song, Look At Us Now, was and continues to be a favorite of all of the students. Towards the end of my tenure at Montessori, Annette moved back to the area and was willing to play for our holiday and graduation programs. I was so excited to have this opportunity to get to know Annette because she has been such an influential and talented member of the Anderson community.

Having heard that Annette would be retiring from the Follies after her 30th season, I asked her who would be taking over the position. At the time, no one was slated to take her place and I off-handedly asked, "do you think that is something I could do?" Her eyes lit up and she immediately called David Larson and the wheels began to turn. And, as "way leads onto way" I was offered the position. Fortunately, I was able to observe the Follies for several months while Annette was still at the helm. That in-and-of-itself was a gift and she graciously took me under her wing and showed me the Follies

As I followed Annette around, I was tasked to come up with the next year's show. I began to think of "variety" as being the Spice of Life. That thought evolved into more of "what is it that brings spice to your life?" This may change as you age, but generally speaking, it seems to stay the same; relationships, food, faith, family, fellowship and recreation. For many of us, that recreation involves movement/dance. At the end of our program, you will see a number that represents the dance of life. The idea is that no matter your age, you keep on dancing. The dance may change but it is always there.

In addition to coming up with the title and theme of the show, I had to think about how to handle the music. As you know, Annette is a master keyboardist and has been able to accompany the Follies in rehearsals and performances, a skill I wish I had! As I lamented my keyboarding skills, my prayer was answered by Joe Wehunt who popped his head in rehearsal and expressed an interest in helping. I am so thankful that Joe was willing to come on board as the music director and leader of the band.

He has put together an amazing band and orchestrated much of the music that you will hear today. I feel so blessed to have had this opportunity to work with him and know that you are going to enjoy him as well.

Once the theme was set, I brainstormed with many people as I began the process of putting this show together and would like very much to tell you about them. Kris Yon is my dear friend and has been my muse for many years. She has been by my side through many shows and always has amazing insight. She is a constant sounding board, brilliant costumer, prop master, dramaturg, and a true MacGyver (she can make anything out of nothing)! She also wrote Too Many Cooks in the Kitchen. I really can't imagine 'doing life or theatre' without her. Jim Rasheed is another dear friend and playwright. When I asked him to help with some skits, he immediately said yes and has helped in so many ways. He wrote Splitting Hairs and the monologues in Mama Says. Jim Mylod and Chris Vermillion are Follies members and were on my initial brainstorming team. I bounced a lot of ideas off of them and I know they felt like a backboard on a tennis court. They helped write, organize and just kept things fun and light. After having the main structure of the show, I ran it by many Follies members individually and as a group. The show began to change and grow and take shape as everyone added input and their own bit of spice. Once the music was set, John Yane made an individual track per part to help teach the music. This was a huge help!!! Boyce Skelton created tracks and made them available to the cast. It truly took a village to put everything


**JOE WEHUNT**




# Meet the Writers



### JIM RASHEED

When I accepted the job to Direct Senior Follies, I immediately called my friend Jim Rasheed to see if he would be willing to write a few skits for me. Jim graduated from Brandeis University with an MFA in playwriting. His play, Professional Skepticism, was awarded Brandeis University's Herbert and Beigel New Play Premiere and was given a full production by the theater department. Brandeis also honored Professional





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Skepticism with the 2000-2001 Harold and Mimi Steinberg Prize for Best Original Play.

In July 2002, Professional Skepticism received its first professional production as a world premiere at the Wellfleet Harbor Actors Theater in Wellfleet, Massachusetts. The play was published in New Playwrights: The Best Plays of 2002. The play has since been produced from New York City to Moscow, Idaho.

At Clemson University, his play August Flight was highly acclaimed and produced at the state Kennedy Center/American College Theater Festival, where it was nominated for advancement to regional competition. Clemson commissioned Rasheed to write Our Distinguished Gentleman, which is a historical play about the university's founder Thomas Green Clemson.

Rasheed's other produced plays include The Baristas, Mama Mamie's Departure, That's So Shannon and A Series of Unfortunate Interviews. The Baristas set the attendance record at the South Carolina Repertory Company in Hilton Head Island.

Rasheed is currently working on a television pilot, Divided States, based on his play, The Baristas. He is also writing and directing 2 minute videos for the not-for-profit organization, Rippleofone, to educate high schools on being financially responsible.

After one of the performances last year, Jay Wright from the Writers Guild approached me and asked if I would be interested in judging their 10 minute skit contest, with the stipulation that I could use any of the pieces in the Follies if I so chose.
